

In Q3 2023, at 66%, the participation rate in the South West region was similar to the overall participation rate for the State, with an increase of 2.3 percentage points between Q3 2022 and Q3 2023.



Gender



Employment increased for both males and females, with the increase for males (5%, or 10,300 persons) higher than for females (4%, or 7,500 persons).

Occupation

- The largest increase was for elementary occupations (11,300 extra workers, or +38%), representing almost 60% of the total increase in employment in the South West.
 - The largest declines were for associate professionals (-2,600, or -7%) and operatives (-2,500, or 8%).

Sector

- In the year to Q3 2023, the largest increase was for the accommodation/food sector (+36%, or 9,200 extra workers), reaching its highest employment level to date.
- In contrast, the largest absolute declines were for industry (2,300 fewer workers), health, (2,100 fewer persons) and construction (2,000 fewer persons), representing falls of 4%, 4% and 8% respectively.





Overall comments

- Between Q3 2022 and Q3 2023, the labour force participation rate in the South West region rose by 2.3 percentage points, representing the second largest percentage point increase across all regions (after the West region) (CSO LFS).
- The South West accounted for more than a fifth of total agricultural employment in Ireland, the largest share of any region (CSO LFS).
- Between Q3 2022 and Q3 2023, the South West added the second largest number of persons to the workforce (after the West), with 17,900 additional workers; over half of these additional workers were engaged in the accommodation & food sector, while a further 30% were in agriculture.
- The South West accounted for nearly 60% of the total increase in elementary workers nationally, adding 11,300 to this occupation in the year to Q3 2023,
- The South West had the largest increase in the number of unemployed persons across all regions, with an additional 6,000 unemployed in the year to Q3 2023 (CSO LFS).
