Employment

Employment in the Dublin region increased by **11,900 persons (2%)**, below the rate observed nationally of 4%.


Participation rate

In Q3 2023, at 67.7%, the participation rate in the Dublin region was the highest in the country and above the rate for the State (65.8%), despite a slight decline of 0.4 percentage points compared to Q3 2022.

Gender



Employment increased for females (5%, or 19,600 persons), while it decreased for males (2%, or 7,800 persons). Dublin was the only region to record a decline in male employment.

Occupation



 The largest absolute decline was for administrative occupations (-5,200 workers), followed by operatives (-4,100 workers).

Sector


- When compared to Q3 2022, the strongest increases were for education (+10,800 persons), public admin/defence (6,800 people) and ICT (6,200 people), representing growth of 19%, 17% and 8% respectively;
- In contrast, there was a 17% fall in construction employment (7,900 fewer workers) and a 14% fall in industry (9,200 fewer people).

Persons at work by age and county, Census 2022

Nationally, 8% of the workforce was aged 15-24 years, 73% were aged between 25 and 54 years, and 19% were aged 55 years or more. At 20%, Dun Laoghaire Rathdown was the only administrative county in this region in which the share of older workers (i.e. aged 55+) was higher than the national average (19%).



Overall comments

- Dublin was the only region where the labour force participation rate declined in the year to Q3 2023 (CSO LFS).
- Dublin accounted for 29% of total national employment in Q3 2023, but it made up 49% of total ICT employment nationally and 50% of all finance etc employment (CSO LFS).
- At 5.1%, the Dublin region had the second highest unemployment rate across all regions (compared to 4.6% on average nationally); this region also had the largest number of unemployed persons, at 42,000 (CSO LFS).
- At 41%, the Dublin region had the highest share of persons working from home, nine percentage points more than the national average. The Dublin region accounted for 38% of all persons working from home in Ireland in 2022 (Census 2022).
- At 64%, Dun Laoghaire Rathdown had the highest share of persons aged 15+ with third level qualifications, considerably higher than the national average (42%) (Census 2022).
- Although there were a number of significant job losses announced (e.g. Salesforce, Meta, Paypal, Amazon, Google, Accenture, among others), ICT employment in the Dublin region grew in the year to Q3 2023, at a rate that was higher than average employment growth for the region (8% compared to 2% across all sectors).
